# SPAIN'S CONTRIBUTION TO THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION


1776 – 1779 Secretly loaned \$300,000 to the Continental Congress through agent Oliver Pollock, spied on the British for the Colonists and gave refuge to the rebels.

June 21, 1779 Declared war against England:

"Royal Proclamation of His Majesty (Carlos III) in which He Manifests the Just Motives for His Royal Resolution of 21<sup>st</sup> of June of this Year (1779) Authorizing his American Vassals to Seek Amends by Way of Reprisals and Hostilities, on Land and Sea, Against The Subjects of the King of Great Britain."

August 26, 1781 – Provided \$1,000,000 silver pesos to the Continental Congress to help seal the victory at Yorktown on October 19, 1781

Led 7,000 man army composed of Spaniards, Mexicans, Cubans and other Hispanics capturing British forts on the Mississippi River and Florida coast.



Mobile, Alabama – March, 1780 (21-day siege)


Fort St. Joseph, Michigan – February, 1781

# CAPTAIN MAXIMILIANO LUNA SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR HERO




### CAPTAIN MAXIMILIANO LUNA

Native son of a New Mexico pioneer family that settled there in the 1700s.


Graduated from Georgetown University, Washington, D.C.

#### WORLD WAR II 1940-1945

"The southwestern states gave their full complement, among them thousands of their Spanish speaking sons."

Determining the level of Hispanic participation in World War II can be a daunting task as Hispanics were classified as Caucasian. Only the 15<sup>th</sup> Census of the United States reported a 1,4222,533 "Mexican" population for the 1930's. However, according to the 16<sup>th</sup> Census of the United States, Population Volume II, page 9, "Persons of Mexican birth or ancestry who were not definitely Indian or of other nonwhite race were returned as white in 1940," In 1940, Hispanics, mostly Mexican American, accounted for 3 million or approximately 2% of the U.S. population.

The table below gives an example of official reports with limited data on Hispanic participation. Note that with the exception of accounting for Puerto Rican troops from a U.S. territory, there is no break-down of Mexican American or Hispanic participation. This group is therefore counted under the category of "White".

It is estimated that 16 million men and women served during World War II. It is approximated that 500,000 men and women of Hispanic heritage served in the U.S. Armed Forces. Approximately 1,500 Hispanic women served during World War II.

During World War II there were a total of 406,000 reported fatalities. Many United States minorities served in World War II and suffered casualties. There were about 400,000 women who served in U.S. military worldwide during World War II and an approximately 543 of these women died in the line of duty.
